
Second Sunday Castle Tours







Ice Skating in Bayside

The frozen over pond in Crocheron Park gives residents the opportunity to ice skate during the winter months in Bayside (1914). Through the years, the pond has changed names, including Mickle, Crocheron, John Golden and Golden Pond.



Ice Hockey at Crocheron Park

Although forbidden by the parks department in more recent decades, informal ice hockey games were always a popular winter sport on Golden Pond in Crocheron Park as seen in this photograph from 1967. Since the pond sits low, skating was usually pleasant as cold winds were blocked by the surrounding steep hills.
